COURSE DESCRIPTION

Introduction

The course introduces to the students the art and craft of publication's binding, including the post printing operations such as gathering, collation and folding of printed sheets. Exercises in binding, trimming and finishing operations are carried out by the students.

Understanding the significance and reasons for publication's binding. Materials, both traditional and modern, used for binding. Different types of paper and cover boards for printing. Folding, collating, guard and pairing sections to avoid pagination problems, finishing operations and packaging; practical exercises in the production of various forms of dummies.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Understand the post printing activities in print production such as gathering and collating of printed sections, folding, binding, trimming, finishing and packaging.
- 2. Understand the significance and reasons for binding.
- 3. Study the traditional and modern materials for binding.
- 4. Study binding methods and styles in publication's production such as: (a) saddle stitch (b) side stitch (c) perfect binding (d) spiral binding (e) rimming
- 5. Participate in practical exercises in the production of dummies using various binding styles.
