LCU COVID-19 Protocol Enforcement Committee Swings into Action

The LCU Covid-19 Protocol Enforcement Committee rose from an emergency meeting last Thursday with a renewed commitment to enforce compliance of the Covid-19 Protocols among staff, students and the entire University Community.

The committee which is headed by the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Kabiru Adeyemo also rolled out various degrees of penalty for defaulters of the Covid-19 Protocols. It is believed that the punitive action will serve as deterrent, which will ultimately lead to the prevention and spread of the dreaded virus on our campus.

Non-compliance to the protocol attracts N1000 for students, N2000 for the staff and denied access for visitors. The accounts of the defaulters shall be debited with the university, on a daily basis and as long as they continue to default.

The entire university community is enjoined to take responsibility and adhere to the protocols as stipulated below:

1. Regularly and thoroughly wash hands with soap under

running water or use alcohol-based sanitiser if water is not available

2. Cover your mouth and nose with your bent elbow or tissue when you cough or sneeze. Dispose properly into a dustbin and sanitise your hands
3. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands. Wear a face mask when in a crowded area or when entering offices
4. Maintain at least 2 metres distance between yourself and anyone who is coughing or sneezing around you
5. If you have recently returned from a place or area within the last 14 days with widespread transmission and have fever, cough, or breathing difficulty, stay at home and call NCDC on 0800097000010
6. Self-isolate if you returned from any place or area within the last 14 days with widespread transmission of COVID-19

Important Notice to Staff & Students

1. Students in residency are not allowed to come in to or leave the campus as from 8:00pm
2. All faculty offices will be locked up by 10:00pm
3. No students is allowed to stay on campus overnight for practical or assignment of any kind.
4. The University management uses this opportunity to reiterate that staff and students are forbidden from the Fola fuel station axis. Any student caught in the web of criminality being perpetrated in that forbidden axis faces rustication and any member of staff caught around that axis will face the university disciplinary action.

University Approved Dress Code For Students

Dress Code for Male & Female Students

The University expects all students to be decently and corporately dressed and have on them their Identity Cards, University Branded Lapel Pins while on campus or on excursions or institutional engagements outside the University environment.

1. Dress Code for All Female Students

- i. During normal lectures, public lectures, special ceremonies, Matriculation, Founder's Day, Convocation and Examination, all female students must be corporately dressed. To be corporately dressed connotes a smart skirt suit and blouse, or a smart dress with a pair of neat, covered shoes or sandals.
- ii. Dresses should be of kneel length: The wearing of sleeveless dresses or dresses with very tiny singlet-like straps (spaghetti strap), without a jacket, is strictly prohibited in the lecture room and in the university environment.
- iii. Strapless blouses and scarf are not allowed in lecture halls and the University environment.
- iv. Over-clinging clothing, including hipsters trousers, are not allowed in the University.
- v. Revealing blouses, especially the type of blouse that does not cover the navel, are not allowed in the lecture halls in the University environment.

- vi. Transparent dresses must be worn with singlet or other forms of inner wears. Ordinary transparent dresses are prohibited.
- vii. The Use of face-caps in Lecture and Examination Halls is strictly prohibited.
- viii. Wearing bathroom slippers is not allowed in and around the lecture halls of the University.
- ix. Female students are advised to wear hairstyles that are neat and becoming of responsible citizens.
- x. Female students may wear trouser suits with jacket to match. Tight or clinging trousers are not allowed.
- xi. Earrings and necklaces may be used by female students, provided they are not the bogus type.
- xii. Tight, Faded and $\frac{3}{4}$ Jeans/Trousers are not allowed.
- xiii. Female students can wear low sandals or covered corporate shoes.
- xiv. Piercing of any body part, other than the ear (for earrings), is prohibited, Wearing of anklet (ankle chain) is prohibited).
- xv. Tattoo on any part of the body is not allowed.
- xvi. Traditional or "native" attires are not allowed.

2. Dress Code for All Male Students

- i. All male students are expected to dress corporately. To be corporately dressed connotes a shirt tucked into a pair of trousers with tie, with or without jacket, and a net pair of covered shoes.
- ii. Traditional or "native" attires are not allowed.
- iii. No male student is allowed to wear scarves, braided hair or earrings in the University.
- iv. Fastening of trousers below the waistline is not allowed.
- v. Wearing of long-sleeved shirts, without buttoning the sleeves well or folding, as desired, is not allowed.
- vi. Shirt collars should not be left flying
- vii. Shirts must be properly tucked into the trousers.
- viii. The practice of pulling down one's trousers to the hip line is not allowed.
- ix. Male students are advised to have well-cut hair that is combed regularly.
- x. The use of face caps in Lecture and Examination Halls is strictly prohibited.
- xi. Piercing of any part of the body is prohibited.
- xii. Tattooing on any part of the body is prohibited.
- xiii. Male students are prohibited from carrying bushy and or "Afro" hair styles.
